Theme of the Jamboree - "WA: a Spirit of Unity". The Kanji Character "和" (WA) embraces many meanings such as unity, harmony, cooperation, friendship and peace. WA also represents Japan and its culture.

Young People Selection

We are now accepting applications from youth members who wish to be considered for a place in the Somerset Unit.

If you are interested you will need to:-

Attend a selection day at Huish Woods Scout campsite (near Taunton)

- 1st March 2014 – Yeovil, Frome, South Somerset

- 2nd March 2014 – Camelot, Taunton, Sedgemoor, West Somerset

Everyone from your district will attend on the same day, arriving at Huish Woods at 9.30am You will need to arrive in full uniform and have at least one change of clothes. The day will be spent mostly outdoors and you will be undertaking various activities, so please bring sufficient suitable clothing, waterproofs and footwear in a named bag.

You will be ready to be collected at 4.00pm.

Some of those who attend for the initial day will then be invited to spend a weekend at Tedbury Scout Camp (near Frome) for the final selection. This will be held on 21st – 23rd March 2014.
